

General Rules and Regulations

- 1. Entries are open to 4-H and FFA members of St. Lawrence County and Jefferson County. Any non-member aged 18 and under who clears his/her entry with the department superintendent may also be eligible.
- 2. There will be **no entry fee** in any department.
- 3. Entries are open to both purebreds and grades in the Dairy Show.
- 4. No animal will be allowed to compete in more than one class except in the case of championship, group classes and Department E
- 5. All animals shall be exhibited in the bonafide owner's name, such ownership to have existed not less than 60 days prior to the fair.
- 6. FEED AND BEDDING WILL NOT BE PROVIDED. Each exhibitor is responsible for the care of his/her own exhibit. This includes CLEANING UP AREA at the END of the FAIR! This will be checked by fair personnel and will come out of your premiums if not clean!
- 7. Each exhibitor will be limited to one entry in any one class unless otherwise stated.
- 8. Entries shall be in place by 9:00 PM Thursday and remain on the fairgrounds until 4:30PM on Saturday. No premiums will be paid for animals or exhibits leaving the fairgrounds before the above stated time, without prior approval from department heads!
- 9. Exhibitor space will be given at the discretion of the department superintendent.
- 10. All exhibitors in the cattle, sheep, goat, rabbit and horse departments are required to submit proof of rabies vaccination at least 14 days before the date of the fair to the department superintendents. No animals will be allowed to remain on the fairgrounds without this proof.
- 11. New order requires lactating dairy cattle to be tested and show negative results for Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) within seven days prior to showing costs to be covered by NY USDA APHIS.
- 12. All exhibitors will be required to fill out voucher forms with exhibit name and number and prize awarded. Vouchers must be turned into the office by the end of the fair to receive your premiums. Vouchers need a complete address on them. You will not get paid if they are not turned in! Please print neatly, if we can't read it, you might not get paid in a timely manner. Thank you!

Department E - HORSES AND PONIES

Saturday September 13, 2025 at 9:00AM Judging will take place in the Horse Show Arena

Rules and regulations:

- 1. Current coggins and rabies tests are required for each horse on the show grounds. Exhibitors are required to obtain this information for each horse through their veterinarian.
- 2. Proper equestrian attire is required. This includes footwear with a distinguishable heel.
- 3. A show number shall not be given unless the rider/handler has an ASTM/SEI approved equestrian helmet. Helmets made for other sports are not designed to the unique hazards of equestrian sports.
- 4. Riders must be 8 years old as of January 1, 2025; Riders may not be older than 18 years old.
- 5. All equine showing in halter and showmanship classes must be at least two years of age.
- 6. All equine showing saddle and driving classes must be at least three years of age.
- 7. Stallions are not permitted on show grounds unless they are under the age of twelve months.
- 8. No bareback riding will be permitted on show grounds.
- 9. Junior classes are for exhibitors 13 years old and younger. Senior Classes are for exhibitors 14 years old and older. Walk/Trot classes are for any exhibitors who are 8-18 years of age as appropriate for their individual riding level. Walk/Trot entries may not show in junior or senior classes.
- 10. Exhibitors will be judged using the Danish system The New York State 4-H Horse Show Rules and Hammond Fair Rules are applicable. The judge's decision will be final. Any protests should be directed to the superintendent.
- 11. Paybacks for exhibitors will be based on current Hammond Fair rules. **There are no paybacks for gaming classes or costume classes.**

Exhibits must be from the exhibitor's garden. They should be clean, free from injury, uniform in size, shape, and color, and of the best market size and quality, also true to variety type.

Entry must state correct variety as well as kind of vegetable.

SECTION 1: GARDEN VEGETABLE CLASSES

- 1. Beans....10 pods, snap green or yellow, pole or vine, or green shell
- 2. Beets....3, tops trimmed to 1 inch, trim top root t 1 ½ inches
- 3. Broccoli....1 head or bunch of small heads, 5 or more inches in diameter
- 4. Brussel Sprouts....1 pint baskets
- 5. Cabbage....1 head, 2-4 pounds, with 3- wrapper leaves, market or kraut variety
- 6. Carrots....3, tops trimmed to 1 inch, no green shoulder*
- 7. Chard....1 plant, roots and damaged leaves off
- 8. Corn, Sweet....3 ears, all husks removed, shank trimmed to ½ inch, displayed in bag
- 9. Cucumbers....2 slicing type, 5 inches or longer, 2 inches or less in diameter
- 10. Cucumbers....5, pickling type, 3 to 5 inches long
- 11. Cucumbers....10, pickling type, less than 3 inches long
- 12. Dill ...bunch of 6 seed heads, tied or displayed in a transparent bag
- 13. Eggplant ... a small, slender and round type
- 14. Endive....1 plant, roots off, good market size
- 15. Herbs....1 plant in pot or tied bunch
- 16. Kale....1 plant, roots off
- 17. Kohlrabi....2, tops and tap root trimmed to 2 inches
- 18. Lettuce ...leaf, 1 plant, roots off, good market size
- 19. Lettuce ...head, 1 plant, roots off, good market size
- 20. Onions....3, tops trimmed to ½ inch, well cured, dried, not peeled
- 21. Onions....6, green bunching types, tops on but trimmed evenly
- 22. Parsley....1 plant, roots off, good market size and quality
- 23. Peppers....2, large bell type
- 24. Peppers....3, small types, such as Banana, Hungarian Wax, Cherry, Jalapeno
- 25. Potatoes....3 tubers, may show 2 kinds
- 26. Potatoes....1 pint basket, salt potato types ¾ to 1 ¼ inch diameter
- 27. Pumpkin....1, any pie variety
- 28. Pumpkin....1, any field variety
- 29. Radish....1 pint basket, tops trimmed to ½ inch
- 30. Squash, summer....2, 6 to 10 inches long
- 31. Squash, winter....1 any variety

^{*} denotes exhibitor may show 2 varieties.

- 32. Sweet potatoes...3 roots
- 33. Tomatoes...3 ripe, stems off, medium and large fruited varieties including Roma types
- 34. Tomatoes ...cherry, ripe, 1 pint basket, stems off, also Presto and small fruited types
- 35. Tomatoes....3, green, stems off, medium and large fruited varieties
- 36. Turnips....3, tops trimmed to 1 inch
- 37. Watermelon....1- mature, market size
- 38. Miscellaneous....any other vegetable not listed, display same fashion as most similar crop

SECTION 2: INDOOR GARDENING

- House plants must be single stem or crown in proportional container
- All items should follow recommended guides of balance design, proportion and harmony
- No artificially colored or plastic materials allowed in any indoor gardening class

- 1. Potted Houseplant: flowering, foliage, vine, hanging container, miniature (2 ¼ to 3 inch) container. **May exhibit up to 3 labeled entries**

SECTION 3: ORNAMENTAL HORTICULTURE

SECTION 1: AGRICULTURAL ENGINEERING

CLASS:

- 1. Woodworking: an article constructed from a kit
- **2.** Accessory: a 4-H handyman article made as part of a related project, such as saddlebags, or rope halter.
- 3. A piece of furniture with a natural finish.
- **4.** A piece of furniture with a painted finish; new unfinished, refinished, or constructed by the exhibitor.
- **5.** Miscellaneous: any other item made in metal, wood, or leather not mentioned above.

SECTION 2: HOME ENVIRONMENT CLASS:

- 1. A chair or a stool with new seating
- 2. Fabric furnishings: bedspread, coverlet, quilt, curtains, draperies, etc
- **3.** Fabric accessory item: pillow, placemat, needlework items. Kits will be allowed for accessory items.

SECTION 3: CLOTHING and TEXTILES CLASS:

- 1. Basic Clothing: any simple, intermediate, or advanced level garment.
- 2. Wardrobe Planning: combining 4 or more articles of clothing which can be interchanged to create a variety of outfits. May include items from class 1, combination of purchased items and those from class 1, or all purchased items.
- 3. Miscellaneous clothing and Textiles: remodeled or renovated garment, crochet, or hand knit garments, garments using "heritage" techniques including appliqué, or patchwork.

SECTION 4: FOOD PRESERVATION CLASS:

 Canning, drying, jams, jellies, pickles, relishes. etc. May enter up to two items in each category. All canned goods must be processed according to USDA standards. (Label should include kind of fruit, vegetable, or preserve; recipe and method of preservation.)

SECTION 5: BAKING OR COOKING

- All food entries must be in plastic bags.
- Entries should be labeled with a baked goods recipe, listing ingredients first, then complete recipe.

Note: cool baked goods thoroughly before wrapping. To move food choices toward dietary guidelines, no frostings or toppings are permitted on cookies, quick breads, or cakes. Yeast breads and rolls entries may be brushed with fat, milk or egg before or after baking if what is done is stated in the recipe. **DO NOT USE PLASTIC WRAP.** Do not exhibit cakes in pans or muffins in paper wrappers. Purchased dough is not permitted. Exhibits requiring refrigeration are not permitted.

CLASS:

- 1. Cookies: exhibit will consist of nutritious, low fat, or low sugar baked cookies suitable for snack time, such as oatmeal, molasses, pumpkin, raisin, apricot, peanut butter or date nut; made by exhibitor 3 6 specimens.
- 2. Cookies: exhibit will consist of 2 types, these can be drop, bar, rolled, refrigerator, or molded (not pressed); made by exhibitor 3 6 specimens
- 3. Quick Breads: exhibit will consist of one of the following: 3 muffins, of an approximately 9"x5"x3" loaf of bread (not yeast).
- 4. Cakes: exhibit will consist of ½ of either of the following: plain cake made with shortening or foam type cake baked in a tube pan.
- 5. Nutritious Cake: exhibit will consist of ½ of a cake made with vegetable or fruit (no fruit cake) such as: carrot, applesauce, beet, etc. baked in an appropriate size pan.
- 6. Yeast Breads and Rolls: exhibit will consist of ½ loaf of plain white bread or 3 plain white rolls.
- 7. Yeast Breads and Rolls: exhibit will consist of ½ loaf, 3 breadsticks, and 3 soft pretzels, or 3 rolls of any plain whole grain or multigrain bread.
- 8. International Foods: exhibit will consist of 3 cookies of one type, OR ½ yeast bread, OR 3 yeast rolls, OR ½ quick bread. Include statements containing recipe, national traditions associated with the food, historical background, and how it should be served.
- 9. Any two crust pie disposable pan preferred

- 10. One crust pie (any filling) -- disposable pan preferred
- 11. Cookies novelty special occasion cookies 3 specimens
- 12. Homemade confections: 1 inch square or appropriate size for particular entry 3 specimens.
- 13. Creative Use of a Commercial Mix: Recipe must state what was added to the mix. Cookies 3 specimens, ½ cake, etc.
- 14. Doughnuts: plain 3 specimens

SECTION 6: GENERAL

**PREMIUMS:

CLASS:

1. 4-H members record or scrapbook, personal scrapbook, record of special work in community service, 4-H clothing achievement, or other productive work carried on by the member. Scrapbook may contain clippings, pictures, photographs, and records of work done, may also be in story form.

Scrapbooks and records must be from current year's work.

- 2. 4-H secretary record book
- 3. Public Presentation Posters
- 4. Poster: on any aspect of clothing or textiles.
- 5. Poster: depicting a food from one of the four food groups, food and fitness, wise snacking, food purchasing hints, ways to avoid waste, improving your food choices when eating at a restaurant, or making selections from a vending machine.
- 6. Packed lunch box.
- 7. Recipe Collection: A minimum of ten recipes exhibited in a recipe box, notebook, or file. All information should be printed in ink or typed. Recipes and holders must be the result of the current year's work.
- 8. Heritage Recipes: Recipes should be collected from parents, grandparents, ancestors, or from neighbors and older community members which reflect a variety of foods your family or early settlers brought to your region during a generation other than your own. Include comments about the heritage aspects of each food, how used and by whom.

SECTION 7: ARTS AND CRAFTS

- All entries in this section should be creative, original, and completed by the exhibitor.
- Display small articles on a 5"covered cardboard or index card (use glue, staples, or tape to attach)

CLASS:

- 1. Expressive artworks: drawings, paintings, etc...
- 2. Fiber and Fabric: weaving, braiding, macramé, needlecrafts, string art, tie-dying, etc...
- 3. Sculptured or Molded Material: ceramics, metal jewelry, tile, glass, sculptures, etc...
- 4. Photography: black and white or color enlargements
- 5. Creative Clothing Accessory: designed by the exhibitor and have decorative or functional purpose: i.e.; vest, belt, shawl, headpiece, jewelry.
- 6. Artificial or real floral arrangements to include wreaths, vase, etc. -- children and adults -- adults only get ribbon
- 7. Crafts -- made by exhibitor can come from a kit, artificial flowers, miscellaneous house items, etc.

SECTION 8: CHILD DEVELOPMENT

CLASS:

- 1. Creative plaything: a homemade toy, game or activity to be used with children. Include what age of child intended to use the article and what the child will learn from it.
- Poster about safe babysitting/child care practice or about a phase in a child's development.
- A babysitter kit: include games, toys, and safety materials needed while caring for a baby, toddler, or preschooler. Include explanation of planned use of the articles in the kit.
- 4. A snapshot or picture story on a poster or in an album describing a phase of a child's development.
